# A Walk of Rememberance in Israel

In my second year of Seminary I flew with 45 other seminarians from all over the states, varying in denominations and theology, and travelled to Israel taking a four-week Biblical study and archeologist study class from our professor, Jim Flemings, whose head of red, curly hair bobbed in front of the line of students every day. His catch phrase was, "As we approach this site, take an ability with you." (The ability was the note paper and pen or pencil to take notes).

*I touched the water in the most narrow part of* the Sea of Galilee, walked the dusty roads of Jericho, floated in the dead sea and saw the sites of tomb close to where the dead sea scrolled were found. I touched the wailing wall adding my prayer and saw the Hasidic Jewish clergy moving in the rhythm of new parents swaying back and forth with scriptures in hand praying over the prayers placed in the walls. I saw the old street of Jerusalem. I wondered over the Holy shrines if Jesus had placed his hand where I touched and if at the foot of the mount of Olives where the Church of the Sepulcher of Saint Mary, was really where the remains of Mary the mother of Jesus lie. I had the sweetest tea, in the most beautiful silver tea set on the street of the "old city" and ate the best falafels from the street vendor with questionable oil, deep frying my lunch. I took a city bus, to find many young men holding machine guns like they would a brown sack of groceries, on the bus I wondered if fighting in that area would ever end.

So many teachings I remember and have used time and time again in sermons, communion, bible study, and personal devotion. One of the most evocative, compelling, tangible learnings was the tear cup. In Psalm 56 we read: God collects our tears in a bottle – verse 8. Even in Roman times, around the time of Christ, mourners filled small glass bottles or cups with tears and placed them in burial tombs as symbols of respect. During the American Civil War, women were said to have cried into tear bottles and saved them until their husbands returned from battle.

As I recalled the tear cup, I thought of the tears we have collectively shed during this pandemic, for those without income, home, in isolation, for those in hospitals dying without loved ones, unable to take social interactions. Tears for places in our world where heath care and vaccinations are in deep need yet so limited. Tears when we see that the color of our skin, our age, income or an "essential" job means we have a greater risk of falling victim to a dangerous virus.

These 12 months, have been a time of tears, and there will be more. As we walk to Jerusalem, may we hold our tear cups, so we might feel the sorrow as God does in Psalm 34 where we are reminded how God feels our sorrow even weeps for the devastating blows of His people. Psalm 34:18 promises us that "the Lord is close to the brokenhearted."

Dear UCCEG Family and Friends,

#### UCCEG is Walking to Jerusalem Together, Apart!



As the season of Lent approaches, we turn our minds and, this year, our bodies towards Golgotha, the place of the Skull, where Jesus was crucified on Good Friday. Whilst as a body we cannot be together, we would like to invite every member and friend of UCCEG to join us in walking through Lent to try and reach Jerusalem in time for Easter AND to raise funds in order for our church to THRIVE in 2021.

During the 40 days of Lent, we invite all our members and friends to make time to walk in reflection or learning and record their distance walked each week to allow us to tally how far we as a 'body of Christ' can get towards Greeting the Risen Christ near his empty tomb on Easter Day! Perhaps you could walk after reading your Lent Devotional and reflect, or listen to a spoken word book, podcast or bible reading whilst you walk. Or walk with your family and discuss the devotional together. We will have a shared conversation on our Facebook page around the Daily devotionals and encourage you to participate and share pictures of your walks! Use #walkingtoJerusalem to help us find your pictures and posts!

As you begin this period of reflection, we invite you to choose an amount to donate to church for each mile you walk, or perhaps each day you walk (can you manage all 40 days?) and then make your donation to our Church funds once you complete the challenge at Easter. Perhaps you would like to set an individual target! Can you walk to Bethlehem, PA (82 miles) or to Damascus, PA (183 miles)? Each week we will gather your weekly totals of distances walked, and report on our progress towards Jerusalem! We are a small church, but this is a big walk! Consider getting friends and family to join you on your walks!

# Fun Facts About Easter

- The English word, "Easter" may have come from Eostre, the Teutonic (ancient German) goddess of spring, or from the Teutonic festival of spring called Eostur.

- The word "Easter" is not found in the Bible.

- Eggs represent the new life that returns to nature around Easter time.

- Early Christians of Mesopotamia were the first to use colored eggs for Easter. In some European countries people colored eggs red to represent the joy of the resurrection. - From a Christian perspective, Easter eggs are said to represent lesus'

said to represent Jesus' emergence from the tomb and resurrection. Decorating eggs for Easter is a tradition that dates back to at least the 13th century, according to some sources. One explanation for this custom is that eggs were formerly a forbidden food during the Lenten season, so people would paint and decorate them to mark the end of the period of penance and fasting, then eat them on Easter as a celebration.

- The largest Easter egg ever made was over 25 feet high and weighed over 8,000 pounds. It was built out of chocolate and marshmallow and supported by an internal steel frame.

- The lamb is one of the symbols of Easter. The symbol comes from the Jewish Pesach (Passover) holiday. The Jewish Passover celebration is a partial re-enactment of the events of the Exodus when Jewish families killed a lamb and sprinkled its blood on their doorposts.

#### **More Fun Facts!**

- More than 90 million chocolate Easter bunnies are manufactured each year.



- The most famous Easter parade is held in New York.

- The first Easter eggs were colored red, in memory of the blood Jesus shed during his crucifixion.

#### What Is a Fastnacht?

A fastnacht is a heavy, yeast-raised potato doughnut that is typically prepared on Fat Tuesday before the start of the Lenten season. These doughnuts are part of Easter traditions in Pennsylvania Dutch country, which includes Lancaster, York, and Berks counties in south-central Pennsylvania. Fastnachts are square or triangular in shape and do not have holes in their centers. Square-shaped fastnachts are meant to represent the four gospels of the Bible, whereas a triangular fastnacht represents the Holy Trinity.

Fastnacht Day 2020 is Tuesday, February 25. This day is also known as Fat Tuesday, Mardi Gras, or Shrove Tuesday, which is why the delicious treats are often referred to as "mardi gras donuts". Fasnacht Day is the last day before Lent, the 40-day season before Easter begins on Ash Wednesday.

#### What Does "Fastnacht" Mean?



The term "fastnacht" (also spelled fasnacht, faschnaut, faschnacht ) comes from the German words "fast," a shortened form of the verb "fasten" meaning "to fast," and "nacht," which means "night." Fastnacht Day is the eve of the Lenten fasting period that many Christian denominations observe. Tradition holds that on this day, households use up all the fat and sugar in the house before Lent begins. This practice also gives Fat Tuesday its name.
